The Holden Library Celebration

Growing up in the Park, every time I biked by the library, I felt that something was special about the building. Its scale and proportion were simple yet monumental. Walking inside, even if you didn't know it was a library, you would know to be quiet, thoughtful, and that this was a place of learning. Two years ago, after hearing rumors that the building was designed by the architect Henry Bacon, Trude Fitelson and I traveled to Princeton, NJ to track down some evidence. Bacon is most known for the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, DC. When we found our library listed in his body of work, we made the most jubilant scene possible in a silent archives room. Now, it all made sense.

It is remarkable how we lost the identity of the architect. The 1903 Classical Revival Style building has been able to stand on its own merit through its sheer architectural power. Have you ever walked up the Lincoln Memorial's steps and felt overcome with awe? As a child, I would climb our library steps, open the door, and feel overcome with the possibilities of stories I hadn't read yet. Skillfully designed spaces have that effect.

Preservation is collaborative – many parties are needed to create and maintain valuable community assets. Mamie Heath, who has served as librarian for fifty years, along with the Landmark Society and the Corporation, are excited to announce the Holden Day Celebration on August 2 in honor of Mrs. E. R. Holden, the library's main benefactor. Mike Stedem has conducted research into the Holden Family and has uncovered a fascinating American story. We have invited the Holden family to join us to celebrate their family's contributions to the Park. The Tabernacle is co-sponsoring Dr. Christopher Thomas, Henry Bacon's biographer, to speak at the event and he will share the historical context for the architect's work.

The TI Park Corporation, acting on recommendations and research provided by the Landmark Society, is presently enacting a plan to return the steps to their original design. The current steps are a repair that fails to accurately replicate the original appearance. Bacon's wider design for the steps accentuates the temple front of the portico and invites you inside the building. With this restoration, the Corporation is protecting the architectural integrity of one of our most significant buildings.

We value the library for its simplicity and grandeur. We feel the spirit of the community in its legacy. Some of us, like the children who linger a moment in front as they walk up St. Lawrence, can't yet put our finger on why we love it, but its presence improves our quality of life. The restoration of the steps to the specifications of their iconic designer helps to underscore the fact that the Park benefits from an incalculable wealth of architectural history. Authentic architecture draws people to the Park and ties us all together with a powerful sense of place. Historic preservation needs many hands to be effective and this summer's 111th year library celebration is also a celebration of collaboration and preservation in TI Park. Together, we can continue encouraging our children to explore and treasure our built heritage.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As outgoing president of the Landmark Society, I want to take a pause to highlight some of the collective efforts of leaders and volunteers over the thirty-eight-year journey. Since we were incorporated in 1976, under the name Thousand Island Park Preservation Company, we have come to be called the Landmark Society and our mission of preserving the historical and architectural resources of the Park has remained clear. Documentation of this historic district's built environment, while operating with limited funds, was a focus in the early years. In the 1980s, completion of the National Register Survey led to recognition by the National Register. Other major efforts yielded development of the Preservation and Architectural Review Code and our first Park history booklet. The Landmark Society led fundraising efforts for the Pavilion and McIntyre Photo Shop restoration projects, and we continue our stewardship of these buildings with easements on both. Many annual and biennial activities have strengthened community awareness, appreciation and society funds. Member Only events expand our knowledge of historic sites along the River. Collections of publications, archives, reference library volumes, or exhibits, along with chats and workshops help to build a better sense of the importance of education as a means to preserve this rich architectural heritage. I applaud those who helped to define and widen the path over nearly four decades and urge you to continue preservation efforts.
